With a couple of weeks to go the East Down Squad were looking somewhat depleted due to injuries, operations, non-availability and work?? However, with the assistance of Will Camp and Matt Boni (both scouting and recruiting) the squad was admirably bolstered with new blood. Interestingly the East Down Team was quite a family affair, with the team containing a number of family combinations: Martyn Kemp and sons Darren and Luke, Andy Rigler and sons Lewis and Leighton, Mark Fogg and son Ryan, Ross Middleton and son McKinley and Will Camp and stepson George. There was a good age mix with East Down fielding players  $1 \times 11$ ys,  $2 \times 12$ yrs with various ages in between up to  $2 \times 67$ yrs, a similar age mix was fielded by West Down.

In reasonable dry conditions the game kicked off a little later than advertised at about 11 a.m. It proved to be another great Boxing Day football contest between these longtime adversaries.

With a re-invigorated squad, East Down were looking, bright, keen and raring to go. As a consequence, they contributed to an entertaining and close game with end-to-end action. As the game progressed East Down looked to be edging the first half with some great attacking moves, Freddie Norton had a number of very decent angled shots from the left one of which was goal bound until it was brilliantly tipped onto the

West Down post/crossbar angle by the West Down keeper; Charlie Randall. Young McKinley Middleton (11yrs) was also denied by West Down's keeper who saved his goal bound shot, there were a number of fine shots on goal by East Down and West Down alike. In fact, it is fair to say that West Down's Charlie Randall made a number of very good saves to keep them in the game. Some observers suggested East Down could have been 4-0 up at half time, had it not been for Charlie's saves/agility. The game continued to entertain and remained well contested but somehow remained 0-0 at half time.

After the restart the game continued as before with no let-up in the pace, commitment and end to end action. Amazingly it remained 0-0 until the last 20 minutes or so.

West Down appeared fortunate to score first, after one of their players, collided with East Down's goalkeeper: Darren Kemp as he came out to try and gather a

low cross/shot. Unfortunately, the player's boot caught Darren in the chest, some observers suggested it was perhaps a foul, however after

the collision the ball spilled loose and Alistair Caddick scored For West Down. With no VAR there was no second opinion available and the goal stood. West Down added a second goal with a well taken free kick by Stan White.

As the game entered the last ten minutes or so, there was a late flurry of goals. Harley scored a further goal for West Down, to go 3-0 up. It was still end to end action and East Down were not to be deterred with Lewis Rigler pulling a goal back with an excellent shot beating Randall in the West Down goal to make it 3-1

East Down pushed forward in search of more goals, making them susceptible to the break, West Down broke away and a hard low cross was fortunate to ricochet off Martyn Kemp into the goal to make it 4-1. (Much to Martyn's frustration he stated that was his first own goal in 60yrs plus of playing football!) East Down were not to be deterred and continued to push forward. The excellent Lewis Rigler had a great shot which beat the West Down Keeper, but Rigler was thwarted by an agile West Down defender who made a diving save/handball.

Lewis calmly converted a well taken penalty to make it 4-2.

With the final minutes ticking away East Down continued to search for more goals, leaving themselves exposed to the break away. This eventually happened with Frankie scoring the final goal for West Down who finished victors 5-2.

Some would say the score line flatters West Down as it was a very even game. It is fair to say that Charlie Randall in the West Down goal made some excellent saves and he may just have been the difference in this enjoyable and well contested game.

There were many great personal performances, but Lewis Rigler (making his debut for East Down) was voted man of the match. The trophy is interestingly a titivated sheep's skull salvaged from a previous Boxing Day Game at East Down Both teams adjourned to The Crown Pub, West Down, for some well-earned sustenance; Beer and Curry.

Supporters and Players alike agreed it was another enjoyable Boxing Day game – This legendary fixture lives on.

## **Major Roadworks in Barnstaple**

Please be aware of major roadworks in Barnstaple starting on the 22nd January for the "**Cedars Crossing Scheme**" which will have a duration of 20 weeks.

Significant delays are expected as a result of these works as there are limited alternative routes.

There will be four-way traffic signals, manually controlled. Signals will be taken down when there isn't anyone working as long as it is safe to do so, signals will be removed for the bank holiday weekend.

Starting from 22 January 2024 work is taking place to build a new pedestrian crossing down the hill from the Cedars Roundabout. This will not only help people cross the road here, it will be linked to sensors in the road on the Fremington side of the roundabout. This is hoped to help reduce the queuing at this roundabout for drivers coming from the Fremington direction but have to give way to traffic coming from Roundswell. These works are expected to be completed in June. The works being undertaken include:

- Widening of the southern arm of the roundabout to accommodate the new staggered signalised crossing;
- Realignment of the existing hedge-banks reusing the existing stone;
- Provision of new street lighting, road markings and signs;
- Installation of traffic sensors in the road;
- Relocation of utility company pipes and cables.


