#### Bridleway 48 to be reopened.

Following a High Court decision this summer the bridleway running from Bowden Corner (at the end of Rookbear Lane) to Whitefield Hill is to be reopened. The route has been re-designated as a Restricted Byway (no motorised vehicles allowed) and is to be cleared and reopened for public access by Devon County Council. The route is currently overgrown and impassable but the Council has confirmed that planning is underway to undertake the necessary clearing this autumn. As the work is partly weather dependant, they cannot be exact on timescale, and we will keep you up to date with developments.
